ITINERARY HIGHLIGHTS

September 14, 2010 - Depart Local Airport for Richmond, VA

After arriving in Richmond, you will stop for dinner enroute to the beautiful Berkeley Hotel.

September 15, 2010 - Richmond to Williamsburg

A visit to the American Civil War Center will start your day where you hear the whole story of a conflict that still shapes our nation today. After visiting the Hollywood Cemetery, the final resting place of two American presidents, you will tour the Museum and White House of the Confederacy. Lunch at the Tobacco Company, sets the mood for The Petersburg National Battlefield and Sherwood Forest followed by checking into Woodland Lodge in Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. (B,L)

September 16, 2010 - Jamestown, Yorktown, Williamsburg

Historic Jamestown, site of the first permanent English settlement in North America is the first stop of the day. Jamestown is a place of many beginnings representing the very foundations of whom and what we are as a people and a nation. Before returning to Williamsburg for an afternoon of leisure, you will stop at the Yorktown Victory Center which chronicles America's struggle for independence, from the beginnings of colonial unrest to the formation of our new nation. (B,D)

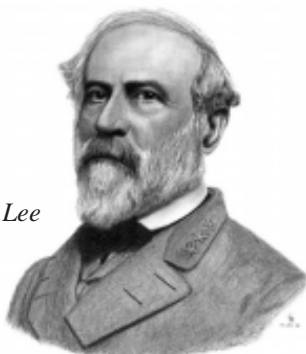

September 17, 2010 – Williamsburg to Alexandria

Today's tour will include three major Civil War battlefields (Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville and Wilderness) along with several other smaller historic sites (Chatham, Guinea Station and Ellwood Lacy House). The battles fought here reflect a continuum of war; the ebb and flow of a nation at war with itself, and the changing nature of the human experience during the 4 years of combat. The battlefields reflect the changing nature of battlefield tactics as they evolved from open-field fighting to trench warfare. These changes had major implications for the soldiers' experience in battle, which changed dramatically between 1862 and 1864. (B)

September 18, 2010 – Mt. Vernon, Manassas, Arlington

After breakfast you will visit beautiful Mt. Vernon, the historic home of our first President, George Washington. This 18th century dwelling was Washington's home both before and after his Presidency until his death. Next you will depart for the Manassas Battlefield. General Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson figured prominently in two Confederate victories here - also known as "Bull Run" on July 21, 1861 and again on August 28-30, 1862. Before having dinner at Via de France, you will stop at Arlington National Cemetery. (B,D)

September 19, 2010 – Washington, D.C.

You will start the day worshipping together at the Washington National Cathedral. Part of the Civil War fort system, Fort Stevens, is the site of the only battle within the District of Columbia. Located on a picturesque hilltop in Washington, DC, President Lincoln's Cottage is the most significant historic site directly associated with Lincoln's presidency aside from the White House. During the Civil War, President Lincoln and his family resided here from June to November of 1862-1864. The afternoon is available to tour your choice of the Holocaust Museum, National Archives or Pentagon. The evening will conclude with a dinner cruise along the Potomac. (B,L,D)

September 20, 2010 – Washington, D.C.

A stop in front of the White House to pray for our president and nation will begin our day! Then we will tour Ford's Theatre, Peterson House and the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. The rest of the day will be spent visiting our nation's most beloved memorials and monuments. (B,D)

September 21, 2010 – Washington, D.C.

Our travels take you to *Capitol Hill* for a tour of our Nation's Capitol and Library of Congress. The afternoon will be spent at leisure to enjoy any of the 19 Smithsonian's museums and galleries. The Smithsonian Institution holds approximately 137 million artifacts and specimens in its trust for the American people. (B,D)

September 22, 2010 – Harpers Ferry, Sharpsburg, Gettysburg

Our first stop today will be Harpers Ferry, the base of operations for Union invasions into the Shenandoah Valley. Stonewall Jackson achieved his most brilliant victory here in September 1862, when he captured 12,500 Union soldiers. Next the Battle of Antietam (or Sharpsburg) on September 17, 1862, climaxed the first of Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee's two attempts to carry the war into the North. An 8.5 mile road leads through the battlefield with more than 300 markers, monuments and Civil War cannons. Before checking into your hotel in Gettysburg you will enjoy a fun stop at Boyds Bear Country. (B,D)

September 23, 2010 – Gettysburg

This morning you will see the showing of "A New Birth of Freedom" at the Gettysburg Visitor Center. Journey through the Gettysburg Battlefield under the auspices of a licensed battlefield guide. Events of Robert E. Lee's advancing army attacking General Meade's Union stronghold dramatically unfold before you. Experience the battle's dramatic climax by retracing the steps of Pickett's Charge and the area where Lincoln delivered his Gettysburg Address. Enjoy dinner at the Dobbin House Tavern. (B,D)

September 24, 2010 – Lancaster

Depart for Lancaster's Amish Country. Arrive in Lancaster and begin a guided tour of the Amish Country, featuring Amish farmlands, Kitchen Kettle Village and Amish Quilt Shops. Lunch is provided at an Amish Home. After lunch you will see the outstanding production of "Joseph" at the Sight & Sound Millennium Theatre. (B,L,D)

September 25, 2010 – Lititz and Philadelphia

This morning you will visit Wheatland, the 4-acre estate of President James Buchanan. Enjoy some free time and lunch in the quaint town of Lititz. The earliest settlers were Swiss-German Mennonites in 1710 who fled religious persecution in Europe. Many 18th Century town buildings have been wonderfully restored and can be enjoyed as you walk through town. (B,D)

September 26, 2010 – Philadelphia

This morning will begin with worship at Christ's Church known as "The Nation's Church" because of the famous Revolutionary-era leaders who worshipped here. After church you will have a guided tour of Philadelphia including Independence Hall, Liberty Bell, Franklin Court and much more! (B,D)

September 27, 2010 – Depart for home with new friends and wonderful memories!
